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Salaam Baalak Trust Delhi literally means "a trust that salutes a child." Our mission is centered on honoring the resilient spirit of street children, without any bias related to gender, religion, caste, color, or nationality. We welcome girls and boys under 18 who are living and working on the streets at our centers.

We 'salute' their determination to lead a dignified life by offering them care and affection, as well as access to health services, nutrition, education, and vocational training to help them achieve their dreams.



Salaam Baalak Trust Delhi is a not-for-profit and non-governmental organisation, based in Delhi, India; registered under the Indian Registration Act (1908). The Trust was established in December 1988 and provides support services for street and working children in the National Capital Region.

36 years ago, we discovered the world of street children within the harsh, raw, underbelly of Delhi. And yet, it was a life these children had chosen in preference to home and family - which had obviously become entirely intolerable.

There is so much missing from the lives of these children – food, security, health, education, and love. We urged ourselves as these resources are the birthright of all children as well as basic requirements – a secure space to sleep, play, and dream.


The mission is to help children experience their childhood in a safe environment and turn their dreams into reality!








Rescue Operations

During the reporting period, 116 children were rescued from child labor and other difficult circumstances.


- 63 trafficked children rescued at New Delhi railway station

Education, Vocational Training and Job Placements

During the reporting period, 6981 received education, vocational training and job placements.

- 4878 Children received non-formal education
- 1783 Children in formal school (229 from SBT homes)
- 163 Children (88 Girls) admitted to vocational training/skill course
- 65 Children received education through NIOS.
- 56 Children (29 Girls) placed in different jobs.
- 36 Children (21 Girls) in higher education.



Medical Programme





Children living on the streets face unsanitary conditions, making them vulnerable to various infections and diseases. To address this, regular medical check-ups are conducted at the full-care Residential Centres and Contact Points.

Each child has an individual health card, and pathological tests are carried out as recommended by the doctors. We employ a full-time doctor at SBT specifically for this purpose, and we also bring in external doctors or specialists for hospital treatments when necessary.

Additionally, children receive regular vaccinations for Hepatitis B and Tetanus. Health camps are organized at the Contact Points to raise awareness and support the basic health needs of the communities.

SBT guarantees that children at residential centers and contact points are provided with nutritious, hot meals. These meals are prepared hygienically under staff supervision. Children with specific nutritional requirements, such as those with Tuberculosis or malnutrition, receive tailored nutrition, which may include protein supplements, additional servings of fruits, and milk as prescribed by a doctor.



Regular Doctor Visits and Need-based care and treatment

SBT has a dedicated medical team, including a full-time physician. The homes and contact points where the children reside and work benefit from regular monthly visits by the doctor, enabling the identification and treatment of any health issues or concerns.

Children receive care and treatment tailored to their individual needs, ensuring they receive appropriate medical attention and interventions based on their specific health conditions.



Vaccination



SBT recognizes the importance of vaccination in preventing various diseases. Therefore, they ensure that children receive necessary vaccinations on time.



Mental Health Programme

In 2003, SBT launched a comprehensive Mental Health Programme (MHP) led by Dr. Amit Sen, a prominent child psychiatrist. The MHP team includes qualified counselors focused on addressing the psychological needs of children in both residential homes and contact points.

The program features a referral system in which staff members can refer children facing emotional and psychological challenges to the counselors. Referred children receive thorough clinical and psychological assessments.

Specialized therapies, including cognitive behavioral therapy, art-based therapy, play therapy, and group therapy, are utilized to support children dealing with significant issues like trauma or depression. Additionally, regular sessions are held with all children, extending beyond just those who are referred.



Children's Achievements

Let's embark on a journey through the remarkable accomplishments of our children across diverse fields, including arts, education, and more.



Academics:

- Samiksha (Sanawer) achieved 89% in her 6th-grade academics, while Laxmi, a 2nd grader, scored 90% (Udaan).
- Vaishnavi secured 84% in 8th grade, Savita scored 74% in 7th, Khusbu achieved 71% in 6th, and Sangeeta obtained 76% in 9th (Arushi).
- Tamanna, Sangeeta, and Mausam received scholarships through Education Access (Arushi).
- Sahil achieved 80% in 6th grade, while Gaurav, Suraj, and Paras each scored 70% in 6th. Ayush scored 79% in 1st grade, Sanju 71% in 1st, and Rohit and Sahil both obtained 64% in 5th (DMRC CHB).
- Mausam secured 85% in 8th grade, Suraj scored 76% in 6th, Deepak achieved 78% in 2nd, Kapil got 66% in 7th, Laxman 64% in 6th, and Salman 64% in 5th (Uday OS).
- Deepshikha achieved 97% in 4th grade, Shikha scored 82% in 3rd, Saimul 86% in 2nd, Sakshi 92% in 3rd, and Nandani obtained 64% in 8th (Mansarovar Park).
- Muskan and Akansha won first and second prizes in a talent hunt competition organized by Bajaj Capital (CWB-Raghubir Nagar).



Sports:

- Deenbandhu, Zakib, Ajju, and Krishna, two special needs children, participated in the Saksham Sportify program. Krishna won a gold medal in the 50-meter race (Aasra CHB).
- Puran received a scholarship in football and will be training at Barca Academy (Football Club Barcelona). He also plays nationally in Bhopal/Balaghat – Gurugram (DMRC CHB).
- Gaurav earned a bronze medal at the Delhi Karate Championship (DMRC CHB).
- Arjun was selected for the Young Leaders program for the Street Child World Cup (DMRC CHB).
- For the Street Child World Cup, Arjun, Angad, Arjun, and Kasim from DMRC CHB, along with Harsha from Udaan CHG and Sheetal, Priyank, and Prity from Kishalya, traveled to Chennai. They won 4 out of 6 matches between September 23 and September 30.





Arts:

- Ayush traveled to Chandigarh for the filming of "Sab First Class Hai" (DMRC CHB).
- Rajkumar and Mando were selected for the movie "Movie-Dupki" (DMRC CHB).
- On January 26th, the children took part in a dance performance at the Republic Day parade at India Gate (Kishalaya).
- On March 12th, an International Women's Day program was organized by the New Delhi District Magistrate at the NDMC Auditorium Hall, where SBT's children Preeti, Nandani, and Rekha were honored by the chief guest, Hon'ble Minister Meenakshi Lekhi (Kishalaya).
- The children performed a play at the National Museum in celebration of National Museum Day (Kishalaya).


Salaam Citywalk




Volunteers Program

DMRC Children Home for Boys

The DMRC Children's Home, situated in Tis Hazari, is the largest facility managed by SBT, with a capacity for up to 120 children. It offers a safe and secure environment, equipped with essential amenities. The home also includes features such as a library, computer rooms, and a playground, providing a well-rounded experience for the children.

The DMRC established the DMRC Children's Home in response to the pressing needs of children living on the streets nearby. While overseeing the construction of the Delhi Metro in the Tis Hazari area, Mr. E. Sreedharan, the former Managing Director of the Delhi Metro Rail Corporation (DMRC), was profoundly affected by the sight of so many street children. In line with DMRC's commitment to corporate social responsibility, they built a child-friendly home and entrusted its management to SBT.




Aarushi Children Home for Girls

Aarushi Home, situated in Gurugram, Haryana, is a residential facility specifically created to meet the safety and security needs of girls who are homeless, abandoned, or abused.

The center was established to offer a supportive environment and tackle the challenges these girls face. The committed staff at Aarushi Home forms a close-knit team that works tirelessly around the clock to ensure the well-being and protection of the girls who have been rescued from difficult situations.

Apnaghar Open Shelter

Established in 2003, Apna Ghar is located in the heart of Paharganj. This center acts as a temporary refuge for children in need, providing a safe environment for short-term stays. Apna Ghar supports those who have escaped from various cities to Delhi or have been rescued from exploitative situations like child labor or trafficking. Within its walls, children find comfort and care, able to stay for up to six months as they receive the assistance needed to rebuild their lives or return home.



- Appreciation in reunification process— Uday open shelter has a highly appreciated center in Ghaziabad district by district administration in the restoration of children who were staying for a long time and accessing the service of so many different shelter homes. The child welfare committee specially recommended those children to SBT's open shelter to support in reunification whose family is not reachable.
- **Social Protection Scheme** Aadhar cards were made for 20 children and bank accounts of 4 children were opened.

Contact Points and Community Outreach

A segment of Delhi's population resides on the streets or in slum areas, including vulnerable children who are at risk of trafficking and abuse. Our social and outreach workers work diligently to establish trust and friendship with these children, their peers, and families. We encourage them to participate in SBTs programs at various Contact Points, where they can access education, medical assistance, nutritious meals, life skills training, and opportunities to reach their full potential.





Kishalaya (Hanuman Mandir) Contact Point

Kishalaya, situated near Bangla Sahib Gurudwara in Connaught Place, serves as a hub for various community services. One of its key initiatives is a day care center that addresses the educational and medical needs of children living on the streets or in rain baseras (night shelters). The center not only provides nutritious lunches but also aims to enroll these children in formal schools.

Encouraging parents to send their children to school is a significant challenge, as many depend on their children's income from selling balloons to support the family. However, the dedicated team at Kishalaya works tirelessly to earn the trust of these parents. They recognize the value of education and strive to persuade families of its long-term benefits for their children.

Additionally, Kishalaya addresses the issue of drug addiction among children. Assisting them in overcoming this addiction requires immense perseverance and determination. The team engages with these children, offering support and guidance to help them break free from substance abuse. They implement various rehabilitation strategies, fully aware of the considerable challenges involved.

In summary, Kishalaya is dedicated to transforming the lives of vulnerable children by providing essential education, healthcare, and opportunities to escape the cycles of poverty and addiction. Through their unwavering commitment, they aim to create a brighter future for these children and their families.



GRP and Platform Contact Point

The GRP is situated at the busy New Delhi Railway Station, a central point for children who have fled their small towns, arriving in Delhi with dreams of a hopeful new life. Unfortunately, the reality they encounter often contrasts sharply with their expectations. To tackle this challenge, SBT's outreach team begins its work early each morning, diligently checking trains for children who have run away, been abandoned, are lost, or have fallen victim to trafficking.

The main objective is to ensure the safety and well-being of these at-risk children. For those who can be reunited with their families, SBT team work diligently to facilitate their return. For those who cannot be immediately reunited, we partner with residential homes in Delhi to provide a safe and nurturing environment. These homes offer stability, care, and protection, along with access to education, healthcare, and emotional support.




- We successfully motivated 12 children (including 5 girls) who had been living at the station for over two years and placed them in a shelter.
- We facilitated the reunification of 25 missing children with their parents through announcements made by the railway.
- We organized 8 stakeholder meetings.
- Conducted 2 street plays in collaboration with Sukhmanch Theatre and RCI, to address drug addiction and trafficking.
- We rescued 55 children from 6 separate trafficking groups.
- Conducted a joint rescue operation at the railway station with the support of CWC, Railways, GRP, RPF, and various NGOs.



Mobile School

Every day around 10 am, our bus arrives at Shastri Park to begin its outreach efforts, gathering children from the community for non-formal classes. Our dedicated team is focused on teaching and inspiring these children, especially encouraging both girls and boys to pursue their education. In addition to educational support, we provide regular mental health and medical care, with a doctor and psychologist visiting frequently.

In the afternoon, our bus moves to the Seelampur area, where classes begin. We have noticed that a significant number of the children attending are girls, highlighting the positive impact of the ongoing efforts. Thanks to our interventions, many community children are now pursuing higher education. We have also facilitated the enrollment of children in vocational training programs, helping families take important steps toward independence.

- The team conducted two sensitization programs in collaboration with the Sampark Sathi Foundation, distributing 120 sanitary pads to girls and women.
- In partnership with the post office, 44 accounts were opened at Shastri Park and Seemapuri.

The main goal is to inspire children to pursue computer literacy and vocational training. As a result of these initiatives, many families have begun sending their children to school instead of having them beg.



In this community, it has sadly been a common practice for families to send their children out to beg. This situation requires our staff to build strong relationships with community members to encourage them to reconsider this choice.



Beyond addressing their immediate needs, we also offer non-formal education to those not yet ready for regular school. Our aim is to support their educational journey.

- The teachers at the school have commended the children for their perfect attendance, particularly those who received non-formal education (NFE) before enrolling in school. Gulshan achieved excellent marks and secured 3rd place in his class.





- For the first time, 6 children from the Lal Bagh community performed a dance at the DMRC Independence Day celebration on August 12.
- Kiran and Komal are undergoing on-the-job training at MAX (Shalimar Bagh) and Vardayini Hospital, receiving a stipend of ₹5,000 each.

Cradle to Career (C2C) - Seelampur center

The Cradle to Career program is an initiative by Children's Hope India based in Seelampur, Delhi. The 30/30 model represents CHI's commitment to shaping India's future, starting with early childhood education and supporting children throughout their school years by providing access to technology and essential skills for success. The initiative encompasses STEM education, mental health, health and nutrition, and career guidance.



Project - Children in street situation (CISS)

Approximately 70,000 children live on the streets of Delhi at any given time, with over 40,000 engaged in begging, rag picking, and selling small items. Their work is unrecognized and exploitative, forcing them to survive in unsafe urban environments.

These children lack adequate adult protection, education, and healthcare. Additionally, they face constant threats of trafficking, physical violence, substance abuse, and sexual exploitation, placing them at the lowest levels of social hierarchy and leaving them extremely vulnerable.

In response, Salaam Baalak Trust, in collaboration with the Delhi Commission for Protection of Child Rights (DCPCR), Youth Reach, and PVR, launched the project "Rehabilitation of Children in Street Situations." The mission is to rehabilitate as many Children in Street Situations (CISS) as possible within a year.

Dedicated Project Officers have been assigned to each district to identify and assist these children. They work closely with Child Welfare Committees (CWCs) and District Child Protection Units to ensure proper rehabilitation and financial support, connecting each child with existing government schemes. Currently, we operate in the North-East, South Delhi, South East, and West Delhi districts.



After Care program

Upon turning 18, a child's relationship with SBT doesn't end; it transitions into continued support and care. While they legally become adults at 18, many are not yet ready for independent living. We offer financial assistance for further education and provide housing in our aftercare home.

Even after rehabilitation, we maintain regular communication with these young adults through monthly phone calls to assess their current needs and offer any necessary support.








Established in 1998 by the Ministry of Women and Child Development (MWCD), Childline stands as a pioneering 24-hour national helpline for children in distress.

This initiative, in collaboration with Salaam Baalak Trust (SBT), provides immediate assistance to children facing risks. Whether it be abuse, exploitation, forced labor, or physical injuries, Childline-Salaam Baalak Trust is just a phone call away. Those affected children or concerned citizens can dial the toll-free number 1098 to seek help.

The Childline team promptly responds to these calls and intervenes in the most effective manner to assist the children in need. The service is available across Delhi, with three dedicated Childlines located in Central District, New Delhi District, and Old Delhi Railway Station. Through this vital helpline, vulnerable children receive the support and care they deserve to ensure their well-being and safety.




Childline (Central District)



- 11 children were restored back to their families through the efforts of CWC and the police.
- 6 children received school admissions with the assistance of CHILDLINE staff.




Childline (New Delhi District)



- The team assisted with the admission of 6 children into schools and helped obtain Aadhar cards for 4 children.
- CHILDLINE NDD conducted 2
 rescue operations, during which
 we rescued a total of 9 children
 (5 boys and 4 girls). This
 included freeing 1 child from
 labor and 8 children from
 begging. After their rescue, the
 team provided them with shelter
 homes after CWC production.



Childline (Old Delhi Railway Station)



- Three CHG meeting with the station director and stakeholders was conducted successfully, and the minutes have been shared with the station director and superintendent.
- Out of 1,234 children, 408 (33%) were reached by station-level stakeholders, including coolies, vendors, drivers, TTE, RPF, and GRP.
- A Nuked Natak was held at the station to raise awareness about child labor.
- Awareness drives covered approximately 1,713 individuals through 12 sessions, along with three sensitization sessions with stakeholders and two sessions with children and passengers.
- We have established a positive relationship with the new RPF/GRP officials.

- Participated in a three-day session at NISD Dwarka focused on the issue of begging.
- An audit visit was conducted at CHD by the ADRM.
- From April 2023 to March 2024, SBT sensitively managed 39 vulnerable cases, which included:
 - o 3 intentionally abandoned children
 - o 2 child marriage cases
 - o 1 de-addiction case
 - 2 inter-gender attraction cases
 - o 2 hospitalized cases requiring immediate medical support
 - 7 family dispute cases related to child marriage
 - o 1 case of mental illness
 - o 1 orphaned female child
 - 12 cases of sexual abuse or POCSO
 - 5 trafficking cases
 - o 3 rescued children
- Between April 2023 and March 2024, 12 POCSO FIRs were filed.
- From May 2023 to September 2024, 5 FIRs related to trafficking were filed.
- Additionally, 2 FIRs concerning child marriage were filed in April and September 2024.

Case Studies

Hope Renewed: Taimur's Swift Heart Surgery

Taimur, a four-year-old boy, lives in Palwal, Haryana, with his family. His father works as a tailor, while his mother takes care of the household and their three children, including Taimur and his two brothers, who are currently in school. Despite his tender age, Taimur was diagnosed with a serious heart condition, specifically a hole in his heart and blocked veins, which posed significant health risks.

Initially, doctors scheduled Taimur's surgery for a year later, which caused great concern for his family given the urgency of his condition. Understanding the critical nature of Taimur's health issue, SBT stepped in to provide support. They facilitated consultations with medical professionals to reassess his situation.

Thanks to their intervention, Taimur's surgery was expedited, allowing him to undergo the necessary operation within just one to two months. The procedure took place at a hospital in Palwal, where the medical team was able to provide timely and specialized care. This swift action not only addressed Taimur's urgent health needs but also brought renewed hope to his family, significantly improving his quality of life and ensuring a brighter future for him.



Sagar's Journey to Recovery

Sagar, a 15-year-old boy from Madhubani, Bihar, faced significant challenges, including anemia, drug abuse, and family issues after losing his parents. His situation took a turn when a social worker from Salaam Baalak Trust found him at New Delhi railway station while he was traveling from his uncle's house to his sister's. After contacting his sister, who refused to take him in, Sagar was placed in the Apna Ghar shelter on January 11, 2023.

At the shelter, Sagar was provided with immediate medical attention and special nutrition, which included foods like kiwi, protein-rich eggs, and pomegranate. His health improved, with his hemoglobin rising from 3.4 to 11.7. Sagar also attended non-formal education (NFE) classes and demonstrated advanced proficiency in English, Hindi, and math, enjoying activities like carrom and ludo with new friends. He was enrolled in vocational training in tailoring, gaining valuable skills.

Feeling safe and secure at Apna Ghar, Sagar benefited from regular counseling sessions that helped him address emotional challenges and build self-confidence. Efforts were made to trace his family, and his sister expressed willingness to restore him after his treatment. Sagar's remarkable progress highlights the power of care, support, and determination in transforming lives.



A New Beginning: Kareena's Journey at Aarushi Children's Home

Kareena (name changed) entered Aarushi Children's Home under the Salaam Baalak Trust in 2020 after enduring a traumatic childhood. Following her mother's death and her father's alcoholism, her living conditions were no longer safe. Concerned for her safety, Kareena's elder sister, who was married, brought her before the Child Welfare Committee. After a comprehensive social investigation by the police, the committee ordered her placement at the home.

Upon arriving at Aarushi, Kareena faced several behavioral challenges stemming from her past trauma. However, with the unwavering support of the staff, she gradually adapted to her new environment. Initially uninterested in school, Kareena became engaged in her studies thanks to the creative methods used by her teachers. Enrolled in Kitty Garden Senior Secondary Public School, she completed her 8th grade with an impressive 84%. Kareena is now a dedicated student who aspires to become a lawyer, showcasing her resilience and determination to create a better future for herself.

From Shadows to Sunshine: Raveena's Inspiring Transformation

In 2020, Raveena (name changed) came to Aarushi Children's Home, part of the Salaam Baalak Trust, after suffering from a traumatic childhood marked by her mother's death and sexual abuse by her father, which led to her pregnancy. Seeking safety, she and her three younger siblings were placed in the home through the Child Welfare Committee.

Initially stressed, Raveena received mental health support and, after giving birth, placed her baby for adoption. Her eagerness to learn was nurtured through non-formal education and participation in center activities. With a keen interest in housekeeping, she completed training with the Sathiya organization.

Today, Raveena works at the IBIS Hotel in Mahipal Pur, having successfully rehabilitated after three years at Aarushi. She now lives a fulfilling life, showcasing her resilience and the positive impact of the support she received.

Transforming Pain into Progress: The Story of Atif and Salman

Atif and Salman arrived following a Child Welfare Committee (CWC) order. The brothers were deeply affected by the traumatic loss of their mother, who had been murdered by their father—a horrifying incident they witnessed. Prior to this, they lived in a home marked by domestic violence and had never attended school, as their parents, both laborers, would leave them locked inside during the day.

When they first arrived, Atif and Salman were in shock and struggling with grief. Our priority was to create a safe environment and provide emotional support through counseling to help them process their loss. With time and care, the boys became more stable.

Now, both Atif and Salman are enrolled in a formal school and are thriving. They have found joy in learning and embrace their education with enthusiasm. Their recovery journey continues, but they are on a positive path, supported by the structure and care they needed.

<u>Lighting the Way: Jafar's Journey from Darkness to</u> <u>Opportunity</u>

Jafar grew up in Seelampur, Delhi, surrounded by poverty and domestic violence. To survive, he engaged in rag picking, and his future seemed bleak. His life changed when he encountered the Salaam Baalak Trust's Mobile School Bus, which provided access to education, counseling, and support, igniting his determination to change his circumstances.

Despite the challenges, Jafar enrolled in formal schooling and excelled academically, ultimately gaining admission to the University of Delhi to pursue a degree in Political Science. Family counseling sessions through the Trust helped heal relationships at home, allowing Jafar to become a positive influence in his family.

Now, as a guide in Salaam Baalak Trust's City Walk program, Jafar earns a monthly income of ₹15,000. His journey from struggle to success exemplifies the transformative power of education and support, inspiring others trapped in poverty. Jafar's story is a testament to resilience and the potential for change driven by hard work and determination.



Threads of Change: Zakira's Inspirational Journey



Armed with her newfound knowledge, she ventured into freelance beauty services, offering her expertise to clients throughout Seelampur.

Zakira's ambition didn't end there. Balancing her passion for beauty with her academic goals, she continued her studies and, with the support of the CHI-SBT program, successfully completed her BA with first division honors in her final year.

Today, Zakira stands as a shining example of empowerment and resilience, serving as a beacon of hope for others in her community. Through her commitment to learning and determination, she has transformed her own life and inspired those around her to dream bigger and reach higher.

As Zakira forges ahead on her path to success, her story reminds us that with education, support, and determination, anything is achievable. From tailoring to beauty and beyond, Zakira's journey exemplifies the limitless potential that exists within each of us.





Kicking Through Challenges: Pura's Football Journey

Pura Bahadur, an 18-year-old boy, has been living at the DMRC Children's Home since 2012 after becoming separated from his family during a vacation in Delhi when he was just nine years old. Originally from Nepal, he was rescued from ISBT at eight and subsequently placed in the Salaam Baalak Trust's care. At the Children's Home, Pura actively engaged in various activities and demonstrated a strong eagerness to learn, which laid the foundation for his educational success. Despite facing significant challenges and lacking family support, he sought psychological and material assistance from SBT, showing determination to build a brighter future.

Pura began his schooling in Class II at Lali Bai School and later moved to Class IV at Saraswati Shishu Bal Mandir due to his strong academic performance. Now in Class XI, he achieved 69% in his Class X exams, adapting well to his educational environment. Throughout his journey, Pura remained focused and avoided negative influences, maintaining his dedication to both studies and sports.

A passionate football player, Pura started playing at the age of 12 and has continued to excel, currently associated with FC BARCA (Conscient Football). He is also a national player receiving coaching at Lovely Professional University in Jalandhar, Punjab. With dreams of becoming a professional footballer, Pura exemplifies resilience and ambition, inspiring those around him.

A Spark of Hope: Prince's Empowering Story

Prince, an 18-year-old boy, has lived at the DMRC Children's Home since 2020 after running away from Asara Home in Najafgarh. His challenging family background includes a physically disabled father and a mentally ill mother, leaving him without stable support. Initially resistant to formal education, he was enrolled in Non-Formal Education (NFE) classes at the home, where staff helped him understand the importance of learning.

As he adjusted, staff discovered his interest in electrical work, leading him to participate in electrician training classes. With regular counseling and support, he thrived academically and personally. Prince is now enrolled in formal electrician training through the Ambuja Cement Foundation, which provides him accommodation and a monthly stipend of ₹6,000. He also attends sessions on independent living skills, setting him on a path toward a self-sufficient future.



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Navigating Change: Makhduma's Path to Stability

Makhduma, an 8-year-old girl, has faced significant challenges since her mother, Farha, who suffers from severe mental health issues, disappeared. Raised by her maternal grandmother, Khalifan, they lived in a night shelter near Jama Masjid, struggling to survive through begging and rag-picking.

These harsh conditions took a toll on Makhduma's physical and emotional health, leading to low self-esteem and poor hygiene. An outreach team connected with them when she was just a year old, encouraging Khalifan to enroll Makhduma in a Contact Point program. This intervention helped them understand the importance of health and hygiene, and Makhduma eventually began her education in first grade.

Despite her enrollment, Makhduma's school attendance was irregular, often wandering instead of attending classes. Recognizing the need for a more stable environment, the outreach team presented her case to the Child Welfare Committee (CWC). Concerned for her safety, the CWC ordered her placement in Udaan Home, Kamla Nagar, where she could receive necessary care.

Makhduma is now at Udaan Home, where an individual care plan is being developed for her rehabilitation. With the continued support of the shelter and the dedicated team, there is hope for a brighter future in which her basic needs are met and her emotional and educational growth is nurtured.

Chhuimui's Journey to Wellbeing

Nisha Sukrawa, a Community Engagement Officer at the Child Wellbeing Center in Model Town, identified six-year-old Chhuimui during an outreach at Lalbagh Community. Chhuimui, who has an intellectual disability, was previously treated at Lok Nayak Hospital. Her mother sought help to apply for a disability pension, as she was unfamiliar with the process and lacked support from Chhuimui's father, who lived separately due to family disputes.

Chhuimui has three siblings, and her mother is a homemaker. The officer opened a guardianship account for Chhuimui at Bank of Baroda to facilitate the pension payments and updated their Aadhaar cards. After a technical rejection of the initial pension application, the officer successfully re-applied, securing approval from the Social Welfare Department.

Chhuimui was linked to the center's creche, where she received nutritious meals, while her younger sister Gangotri was applied for school admission. Regular health check-ups and counseling sessions helped both girls and their mother feel supported.

Over time, Chhuimui transformed from a hesitant child to one who joyfully interacts with the staff and participates actively in center activities, significantly improving her emotional and physical well-being.

From Childhood Labor to a Promising Career: Sohail's Journey

Sohail, an 18-year-old from Shastri Park, Delhi, faced economic challenges in his family. His father, Md. Ibadat, worked as a daily wage laborer, while his mother, Khairun Nisha, stayed home with their five children. Originally from Bihar, the family struggled financially, and Sohail was in Class X when his father considered sending him and his siblings into child labor.

A turning point came when the Mobile Bus Team identified Sohail's situation during an outreach program. Initially hesitant, his parents were encouraged by neighbors to engage with the team. Sohail's mother learned about educational and vocational opportunities, leading to Sohail's enrollment in a hair-cutting training program.

After completing the training, Sohail opened a small shop, but it faced challenges. The Mobile Bus Team then helped him secure a housekeeping job at the Shastri Park Metro, where he now earns INR 19,000 per month. Grateful for the support, Sohail stays in touch with the team and is committed to improving his family's situation while helping others through the mobile bus program. His story highlights the impact of timely intervention and vocational training.

A Second Chance: The Story of a 15-Day-Old Abandoned Boy

On January 16, 2024, a 15-day-old boy was discovered abandoned at the Avadh Assam Train platform by the SBT ODRS team, in coordination with the Railway Protection Force (RPF). The situation arose when the RPF received information about a solitary child aboard the train. Acting swiftly, the SBT ODRS team arrived at platform number 16 and found the infant alone in the train toilet. They promptly transported him to the child line office, where he was provided with essential items, including diapers, a milk bottle, and small clothes to ensure his immediate comfort and care.

To trace the child's family, the outreach team conducted a thorough investigation, speaking to nearby vendors, porters, and other station staff to gather any leads. They also reviewed CCTV footage and made public announcements in hopes of locating the parents. Additionally, messages about the abandoned child were circulated in local WhatsApp groups to widen the search. Despite these extensive efforts, the team was unable to find any relatives or contact information, leaving the infant in a vulnerable position without any known background.

Recognizing the urgent need for action, the Government Railway Police (GRP) registered a DD entry for the child. He was then taken for a medical examination at Aruna Asaf Ali Hospital to ensure his health and well-being. Following the medical assessment, the child was presented before the Child Welfare Committee (CWC-III). Ultimately, to provide a safe and nurturing environment, he was placed in Palna Shelter Home in Kashmere Gate, where he would receive the necessary care and support for his development.



Breaking the Cycle: Sohail's Triumph Over Addiction

Sohail, a 16-year-old from Seelampur, Delhi, faced significant challenges in his young life. Coming from a family where his father is an auto driver and his mother is a housewife, he has one brother. Sohail struggled academically, having repeated a year and sought treatment for substance abuse at SPYM on two occasions. His turning point came when he was rescued by the ODRS team while using drugs at a train station and was subsequently presented to the Child Welfare Committee (CWC-III).

Recognizing his long-term drug use, the CWC mandated de-addiction treatment for Sohail. Initially hesitant to attend the de-addiction center, he eventually agreed after multiple counseling sessions. He was referred to SPYM, where he successfully completed his treatment.

Upon returning to the ODRS open shelter, Sohail faced initial reluctance from his father to take him back due to past frustrations over Sohail's behavior. However, the team provided counseling for both Sohail and his family.

After a month of follow-up, he was restored to his father's custody, with recommendations for regular check-ins for six months. Now, both Sohail and his family are thriving, expressing gratitude for the positive changes in his life and the support they received from Salaam Baalak Trust.

Building a Better Tomorrow: Abhisekh's Journey

Abhisekh is the eldest of three siblings in a family struggling with low income. His father, a factory worker, often falls ill, while his mother works as a maid. Despite these challenges, his father dreams of a better future for Abhisekh through education.

At eight years old, Abhisekh joined the Salaam Baalak Trust's mobile school at Mansarover Park Jhuggi Basti. Initially unruly and struggling academically, he frequently disobeyed his parents and fought with his younger sisters. Concerned, counselors provided individual sessions and engaged him with drawing activities, which helped spark his interest in learning.

Now, Abhisekh is a dedicated student who attends school regularly. He completed his Class 10 exams with 52% and has finished Class 12 in the arts stream. Aspiring to become a police commissioner, he has made his family proud, with the support of Salaam Baalak Trust playing a crucial role in his transformation.

From Streets to Stability: The Journey of Rashmi and Jatin

Rashmi, 12, and Jatin, 10, live with their parents, Komal and Dasannad, on the streets of New Delhi Railway Station, where their parents work as ragpickers. Unfortunately, the family's financial struggles, exacerbated by the parents' alcohol consumption, leave the children neglected and malnourished.

When the Salaam Baalak Trust team first met Rashmi and Jatin, they found the children begging and initially reluctant to engage, fearing shelter placement. However, after discussions, the parents agreed to visit the center, where they saw the benefits of a safe environment with meals and education.

With support from the team, Rashmi and Jatin obtained Aadhaar cards and enrolled in the Non-Formal Education (NFE) program, learning basic literacy skills. Their parents are now seeking regular employment, recognizing the importance of investing in their children's education.

At the center, the children receive health checkups, nutrition, and counseling, leading to significant improvements in their health and well-being. Each morning, they arrive at the center, participate in learning activities, and enjoy nutritious lunches, showcasing their remarkable transformation through dedicated support and intervention.



Guided by Compassion: A Journey of Healing and Growth

This case involves five siblings—four brothers and a sister—who became orphans after their mother succumbed to tuberculosis and their father's struggles with alcoholism left them without support. In their time of need, a neighbor named Sardar Ji stepped in to provide food and emotional care.

The eldest brother took on the role of breadwinner by working as an e-rickshaw driver, but his earnings were minimal after paying the owner. Their situation improved when the Salaam Baalak Trust (SBT) CWBC Raghubir Nagar team helped the siblings obtain essential legal documents and enroll in formal education.

The Child Welfare Committee facilitated the schooling of the three younger siblings and recommended two for a sponsorship program that provided additional support. The SBT team also helped the second eldest brother secure a better-paying job, increasing his income and providing financial stability.

Through the combined efforts of Sardar Ji, the SBT team, and the Child Welfare Committee, the siblings turned their adversity into a success story, thriving through education and newfound opportunities for a brighter future.

<u>Inspiring Change: Jyoti's Story of Courage,</u> <u>Commitment, and Culinary Dreams</u>

Jyoti, a 19-year-old pursuing a B.Sc. in Hotel Management at the Institute of Hotel Management (IHM) in Jaipur, has shown remarkable dedication since joining the Trust at age six in 2010. Early on, she developed a passion for boxing, kickboxing, and karate, achieving national-level awards in kickboxing and earning an orange belt in karate.

While completing her 11th and 12th grades, Jyoti also enrolled in a Diploma course in Culinary Catering, showcasing her commitment to her culinary aspirations. After graduating high school, she took a significant step by enrolling in IHM, where she has excelled academically and received accolades for her baking skills.

In addition to her studies, Jyoti participates in community initiatives, earning certificates for her involvement in street plays and hygiene awareness rallies. Currently focused on honing her skills, Jyoti exemplifies resilience and a passion for both culinary arts and social impact.

<u>Lights, Camera, Advocacy:</u> <u>Kashish's Story of Empowerment</u>

Kashish, an 18-year-old student at Jagran Lake City University in Bhopal, is pursuing a Bachelor's degree in Journalism and Mass Communication. She joined the Trust at age three and has consistently excelled academically, achieving 70% in her Grade 12 CBSE Board Exams and topping her school in Physical Education with 89%.

Driven by a passion for advocacy, Kashish has actively raised awareness about social issues through speeches and plays. Her talent was recognized in 2017 when she received a National Award from former President Ramnath Kovind for her role in the play "Sheroes."

Additionally, Kashish starred as the lead actress in the Hollywood movie "I Origin." Currently, she focuses on the "Theory of Communication," equipping her to share the stories of marginalized individuals. Her ultimate goal is to become a journalist advocating for those without a voice, and with her determination, she is on track to make a significant impact in journalism.



A Ray of Hope: Harsh's Story of Healing and Resilience

Harsh (pseudonym), an 11-year-old boy, was discovered wandering near a steel factory in Modi Nagar. He appeared frail and was unable to communicate verbally, relying on sounds and gestures. Recognizing his urgent need for care, the Child Welfare Committee (CWC) placed him in the Uday Open Shelter for boys on July 19, 2023. The shelter staff and other children provided a warm welcome, creating a safe environment to help him adjust emotionally.

Gathering information about Harsh was challenging due to his inability to speak. However, he had no hearing impairment and could follow simple instructions. He often expressed distress by saying "mummy," showing he missed his home. His physical condition raised concerns; he weighed only 19 kg and exhibited signs of malnutrition, fear of darkness, and anxiety around police and sirens. Additionally, he faced sensory difficulties and struggled with motor skills, often sitting in a 'W' position and having trouble with fine motor tasks.

To address his need for safety, shelter staff worked to help him feel secure. They established a daily routine and stayed with him at night to alleviate his fears. For his physical health, an in-house doctor implemented a special diet and conducted blood tests, which indicated mild intellectual disabilities. This tailored nutrition significantly improved his health, and by the time of his transfer, he had gained weight, reaching 25 kg.

At first fearful and anxious, Harsh flourished in the nurturing environment of the shelter. Weekly counseling sessions focused on his sensory challenges and fine motor skills. The use of the MSIED Kit notably enhanced his coordination and strength, while social skills training enabled him to engage appropriately with others.

Harsh found joy in activities like coloring and dancing, which provided sensory feedback and boosted his self-esteem. He actively participated in various center activities, receiving positive reinforcement for his involvement.

Despite extensive efforts to locate Harsh's family, including outreach to local police and community members, no leads emerged. Ultimately, the CWC decided to transfer him to a special home for continued support. On January 16, 2024, Harsh was placed at Dristi Samajik Seva Sansthan in Lucknow under the Juvenile Justice Act 2015.
